



Why use an Autodesk Authorised Training Centre (ATC)?

Let's face it. We all need training at one time or another, whether it is an AutoCAD course or a Revit Architecture course. All of the courses we attend provide us with the knowledge we require to use our Autodesk software and we need that training to enable us to move forward and develop.

There are many organisations out there offering training, but who do you use? Who gives you the best training? Who has the highest quality of instruction? There is no simple answer here. Your organisation may have a specific training contractor looking after their training needs. However, for Autodesk training, the best person to provide that training is Autodesk (of course!). Autodesk do not provide direct training to the end user, but they provide training indirectly through their Partner Program of Autodesk Authorised Training Centres (ATC's).

An Autodesk ATC provides the trainee with two unique offerings:

Autodesk Official Training Courseware (AOTC)

All Autodesk ATCs provide Autodesk Official Training Courseware (AOTC) to the trainees attending their courses. This is in the form of a comprehensive manual including process overviews of exercises that will be performed during the course as well as challenge exercises allowing the trainee to test their knowledge gained in each chapter of the courseware. There is also a CD-ROM provided that contains all of the exercises in Autodesk DWG format. It also provides a browser-based set of the exercises covered in the course.

Autodesk Approved Instructors (AAI's)

An Autodesk Approved Instructor (AAI) is exactly that. He or she will be an instructor approved by Autodesk to instruct on an Autodesk product. For example, I am an Autodesk Approved Instructor for AutoCAD. To become an AAI, the instructor has to attend annual update courses provided by Autodesk for their product. The instructor then has to take an on-line exam to prove their knowledge on that product. The minimum pass rate is normally high, in the region of 85%. This ensures the instructor has a high knowledge of their product, which, in turn, will be passed on to the trainees on their course.



All ATCs have to have one accredited AAI as part of their instructor team. Also, all ATC instructors, AAIs or otherwise, have to have an Autodesk Instructor ID number that is associated with their Authorised Training Centre. This is linked to the ATC Site ID number to allow trainees to complete their on-line evaluation of their training course. Autodesk utilise this feedback to assess the quality of the training delivered by the ATC. Also, providing the appropriate privacy controls are in place, the ATC can be permitted to use this information to assess their quality of training, allowing them to also maintain a high standard of training.

Autodesk ATCs are your best way forward for high quality, accredited Autodesk product training. All ATCs offer scheduled training courses every month using AOTC manuals and materials. They also offer other training services as well, such as mobile training and custom training.

Mobile training provides an on-site ATC at your premises. Some ATCs are now using the advantage of mobile computing and laptops by providing a completely mobile ATC anywhere in the UK. You still get the accredited Autodesk training with the AOTC manuals but it is at a location convenient to you.

Custom training allows you to specify exactly what aspects of the Autodesk software you wish to be trained on. Most ATCs offer a Training Needs Analysis (TNA). The TNA then specifies what training requirements you have. These are then addressed by the ATC and the custom training is then delivered either at the ATC or by way of the mobile training specified above.
